Week 1 Let Me Re-Introduce Myself

We live in an ever-changing world, we never stop changing and basically, we are made of changes. Take a moment to reflect on yourself in the moment to find things that you have never thought to be part of you. Do you like them? How do you cope with them?

- Objective: Ice-breaking and continuous self-exploration
- Suggested Activity: Discussion
- Questions:
 - 1. Do you like changes? Why?
 - 2. Think about a change in yourself that happened since the beginning of college and describe it specifically.
 - 3. Think about a change that happened in your life recently and describe it specifically.
 - 4. How do you feel about these changes? Were there any difficulties dealing with them? Do they mean anything to you?

Week 2 Me and Us

"No man is an island, entire of itself." - John Donne

No one, extremely aware of individualism as they are, can ever be truly isolated from other people, certain communities, or, as we call it generally, society. Sometimes, we do want to avoid being seen as one of "those people", but there are equally many instances when we feel great belonging to a certain group, for example, a fan club, a hobby society, an ethnical group, or a country. This week, let us focus on this social side of ourselves to see if there is anything interesting or meaningful.

- Objective: To increase the awareness of the relationship between individuals and other people, the public, and society
- Suggested Activity: Discussion
- Questions:
 - 1. Talk about a social group where you feel belonging and specify your story with it.
 - 2. Do you like the environment where you live? List three influences, good or bad, that the environment exerts on you.
 - 3. Find something that happens in a remote place or seems irrelevant to our daily lives. Conduct research to gain an understanding of it, and then determine its relevance to you. Finally, provide a brief summary to share with us.

Week 3 "Strange" Things

"Existence is Reasonable" - Gottfried Wilhelm Leibniz

Cross-cultural communication can happen everywhere. It could happen in a foreign scenario, a domestic place 100 kilometers away from your hometown, or even just between your parents and you whose bringing ups are substantially different. Under such situations, there are moments of freshness and excitement, and there are also experiences of confusion and shocks that we might describe as strange, weird, or impenetrable. But are they really that impossible for us to understand? Rethink before any quick answers.

- Objective: To increase the awareness of different people, lifestyles, thinking, and cultures.
- Suggested Activity: Discussion
- Questions:
 - 1. Talk about something or someone that you regard as "strange" specifically.
 - 2. Does that bother you? How do you cope with it?
 - 3. Do you have any experience of changing attitudes towards certain things or people that you initially could hardly understand? Tell us.
 - 4. As it goes, *"Existence is Reasonable"*, do we have to love all the different people, things, or cultures in this world?

Week 4 Beauty

It is never easy to define what beauty is, but do not fear talking about it. Beauty can sometimes be elusive but is always generous; it never rejects anyone to find it in every perceivable, however inconceivable, way. In this little game of sense and sensibility, everyone is invited.

- Objective: To talk about the perception of beauty.
- Suggested Activity 1: Poem Reading: Ask students to find poems about beauty and read them in class.
- Suggested Activity 2: Discussion

Questions:

- 1. Talk about a creature that you think is beautiful.
- 2. Talk about an occurrence that you think is beautiful.
- 3. Talk about a person that you think is beautiful.
- 4. Talk about an object that you think is beautiful.
- Suggested Activity 3: Presentation: Ask students to showcase anything that they find beauty in.

Week 5 Science, Technology, and Our Life

- Suggested Activity: Discussion
- Questions:
 - 1. Talk about one advance in science and technology that held your attention and introduce it with understandable words.
 - 2. Talk about one scientific development that makes you feel intimidated and specify the reasons.
 - 3. Imagine, there is a robot that looks, moves, thinks, and talks exactly the way we do (almost human beings). Can you accept it as a member of your life? Describe your daily life with such a robot.

 - 4. Why do we buy things?
 - 5. List three things that are important to you that cannot be bought by money.

Week 11 My Own Swan Song

 - 6. Feel free to add anything else that you would like to include in the design of your funerals.

Attendance:

Make-up Policy for Missed Assignments and Tests:

Students are responsible for the assignments in their classes. Assignments include in-class activities, quizzes, tests, homework, and any other work related to classes. No late work will be accepted without instructor approval; it will receive a grade of 0 (zero).

- If you are absent from class, you should try to contact one of the students in your class to find out what work was missed.
- If you cannot find out from another student about what work you have missed, when you return to class you must talk to your instructors about the missed work and if/when you can make up the work. You are responsible for talking to your teacher; your teacher is not responsible for reminding you about missed work.
- If you are absent from class on the due date of an assignment, you must hand in the assignment and be prepared to make up tests the day that you return to class or on a date decided with your teacher.
