Course Description

This course is designed to transition ESL (English as a Second Language) college freshmen from high school English to college-level academic English writing. It prepares students for ENGCMP152 by developing foundational writing and communication skills. It aims to provide college freshmen with the skills and confidence needed to excel in academic writing and communication at the college level. Students will develop skills necessary for successful academic writing, including grammar, mechanics, sentence style, and word choice. The course will also address common challenges ESL students face in their college-level academic English writing courses. Through a combination of workshops, assignments, and feedback, students will transition smoothly from high school English to the demands of college academic English writing.

Outcomes

By the end of the course, students will be able to perform the following:

- Gain proficiency in the proper use of punctuation, capitalization, and other basic writing conventions.
 - Learn to apply APA formatting style in academic writing.
 - Master grammatical rules and learn to identify and correct common grammatical errors.
 - Develop an understanding of specific sentence styles and word choice in academic writing.
 - Understand the importance of tone and style in academic writing and how to adjust them according to the audience and purpose.
 - Enhance unity and coherence in writing.
 - Effectively communicate ideas in writing.

Assignments and Evaluation

Below is a breakdown of the course's assignments and grading scale. Each workshop will provide students with opportunities to participate and practice. Homework will be assigned to reinforce students' understanding of specific topics discussed in the workshop. Unless discussed with the instructor previously, late submissions will **not** be accepted, and the failure to complete your work will result in a failing grade.

Each **unexcused** absence will bear a penalty of half a letter grade (e.g., from a B to a B- or from a B- to a C+). For each part of a class period missed, a student will receive a deduction of half the point value of a full absence. More than three absences will result in a failing grade for the semester. If you are feeling unwell or need to miss a class, inform the instructor ahead of time by email.

The final grade will be greatly affected by students' attendance and participation. Participation will be assessed holistically throughout the semester. Late attendance, use of electronic devices without the instructor's permission, non-participation in the online/in-class activities will all be negatively reflected in your grades.
