Course Description

This one-credit course is designed to equip all SCUPI students who are taking ENGCMP152 with a working knowledge of the key aspects of academic writing. Through a series of focused topics, students will learn to navigate the complexities of academic writing, including the use of APA style, searching for resources, evaluating sources critically, and developing a strong thesis statement. The course is comprised of classes and revision workshops. It is compulsory for each student to attend a minimum of three 30-minute (or longer depending on unfolding needs and circumstances) revision workshops with the instructor throughout the semester, as well as eight two-hour classes. Through a combination of classes, workshops, assignments, and feedback, students will develop essential skills for academic research and writing.

Outcomes

With the successful completion of the ENGCMP152A courses and workshops, students will be able to supplement the skills derived from their ENGCMP152 course in terms of:

- Using writing strategies for the fluent, appropriate and accurate expression of academic genres in SCUPI and beyond with the use of an appropriate tone, style, content, organization, format, and diction;
- Structuring the content of their writing in a clear, logical, and well-organized manner with appropriate academic voice and sentence style;
- Developing clear and effective thesis statements in academic writing;
- Using digital tools, like search engines and library databases to find print and electronic resources;
- Employing critical searching and reading strategies in academic situations to evaluate research resources for credibility and relevance;
- Taking effective notes and annotating academic resources;

- Applying APA (7th Edition) formatting requirements in terms of in-text citations and end-of-text references;
- Develop an understanding of specific sentence styles and word choice in academic writing.

Assignments and Evaluation

Below is a breakdown of the course's assignments and grading scale. Each class will provide students with opportunities to participate and practice. Homework will be assigned to reinforce students' understanding of specific topics discussed in the workshop. Unless discussed with the instructor previously, late submissions will **not** be accepted, and the failure to complete your work will result in a failing grade.

Each **unexcused** absence will bear a penalty of half a letter grade (e.g., from a B to a B- or from a B- to a C+). For each part of a class period missed, a student will receive a deduction of half the point value of a full absence. More than three absences will result in a failing grade for the semester. If you are feeling unwell or need to miss a class, inform the instructor ahead of time by email.

The final grade will be greatly affected by students' attendance and participation. Participation will be assessed holistically throughout the semester. Late attendance, use of electronic devices without the instructor's permission, non-participation in the online/in-class activities will all be negatively reflected in your grades.
