### **DESCRIPTION:**

This course aims to explore the representation of women in literature across different periods, genres, and cultures. The course will focus on both the portrayal of women by authors and the contributions of women writers themselves. As this course is designed for students not majoring in English literature, the materials and discussions will be accessible, with an emphasis on understanding the broader cultural, social, and historical contexts.

#### **COURSE OBJECTIVES:**

This module aims to help students to

- Understand the evolution of the representation of women in literature;
- Analyze the contributions of women writers to literary traditions;
- Discuss themes such as gender, identity, power, and resistance in literature;
- Develop critical thinking and analytical skills through reading and discussing literary texts.

- 1) Demonstrate an informed understanding of representation of women in literature across a number of periods and genres.
- 2) Demonstrate knowledge of some of the major literary, cultural and historical issues that mattered to the development of women writers in literature and feminism.

3) Demonstrate a developing sense of feminist literary criticism and a growing capacity to analyse key texts in the area critically.
