Course Description:

The purpose of this course is to teach undergraduate students skills for having resilience in the face of commonly experienced stressors and difficulties. Stated simply, resilience is the ability to both survive and thrive. Resilience is not only about the ability to positively adapt in the face of adverse or challenging circumstances, but it is also about learning the positive skills, strategies, and routines that enable one to live a happy, fulfilling, and successful life. This course will provide students with a personalized set of strategies and skills for self-care and optimize their academic and social experiences while at SCUPI and beyond through the writing of diaries. Students will write their diaries in digital format based on free and honest accounts of their experiences in the academic environment, and they will analyze their diary entries for patterns that reveal deeper insights into their true selves. In doing so, they will discover perspectives that will lead to more authentic states of wellness and resilience, which will enable them to transform their fears into aspirations and their challenges into opportunities.

Student Learning Outcomes

With the successful completion of this course, students will:

- Be able to write introspective diaries in digital format.
- Be able to analyze their diary entries in ways that provide insights that enhance resilience to survive the challenges of the academic environment.
- Be able to acquire an authentic self-awareness that enables them to thrive as creative scholars.
- Be able to present their diary-derived insights in a 2,000-word essay in English academic writing using APA formatting, as well as in the form of a poster presentation.

Attendance Policy:

After two unexcused absences, students will lose half a letter grade from their final grade. According to the new Sichuan University policy guidelines, students with more than 4 absences (irrespective of whether these are excused absences or not) will automatically fail the course.

Participation:

The final grade will be greatly affected by students' attendance and participation. For each part of a class period missed, a student will receive a deduction of half the point value of a full absence for that day. Participation will be assessed holistically throughout the semester. Late attendance, use of electronic devices without the professor's permission, non-participation in the online/in-class activities, and not submitting homework will all be negatively reflected in your grades.

Student Responsibility:

It is your responsibility to keep track of your assignments, the due dates, as well as additional information announced by the professor. It is also your responsibility to ask me if you need clarification.

A Note Concerning Plagiarism, Translator, and AI Use:

The class adopts a zero-tolerance policy towards plagiarism, translation, and AI use. You should never copy the words of another and present those words as your own work. The professor has access to powerful software that is very effective in determining whether an assignment has been plagiarized, translated, or written (either in whole or in part) by Artificial Intelligence (AI). Any assignment found in transgression of this rule will be automatically disqualified, and an F grade will be assigned. All papers, including the diaries, must be written in English and in your own words. Also, any paper that is written in Chinese and then processed through an online translator will also be considered unacceptable. If you are unsure of the meaning of the above, it is of absolute and vital importance that you ask your professor for clarity.

Student Use of Electronic Technology Policy:

Students must use electronic technology (including cell phones, laptops, tablets, and iPads) in appropriate ways during classes. Out of respect, cell phones should generally be turned off or on silent and stored out of sight. They should not be used during classroom activities unless the professor has given permission. Electronic devices are forbidden during quizzes, tests, or other in-class graded assignments, unless the professor has given permission. Technology use in this class is meant to improve the learning environment for all students. Please be respectful of your professor and classmates and use the technology appropriately. If you have questions about what this means, please talk to your individual professor.

Recording:

To ensure the free and open discussion of ideas, students may NOT record classroom lectures, discussions, and/or activities without the advance permission of the professor, and any such recording properly recorded in advance can be used solely for the student's own private study. Any reposting of recorded course materials may result in expulsion from the course.

Make-up Policy for Missed Assignments and Tests:

Students are responsible for the assignments in their classes. Assignments include in-class activities, quizzes, tests, homework, and any other work related to classes.

- If you are absent from class, you should try to contact one of the students in your class to find out what work was missed.
- If you cannot find out from another student about what work you have missed, when you return to class, you must talk to your professor about the missed work and if/when you can make up the work. You are responsible for talking to your professor; your professor is not responsible for reminding you about missed work.
- If you are absent from class on the due date of an assignment, you must hand in the assignment and be prepared to make up tests the day that you return to class or on a date decided with your professor.
- If you know you will be absent, talk to your professor before you leave or email your professor to find out about the work that you will miss while you are away.
- If you have not been absent from class and you want to hand in an assignment late, you must first discuss the reason with your professor before or on the due date. Do

not assume that your professor will accept late assignments. Also, you may lose points for late work based on the professor's discretion.

- If you and your professor arrange to meet so that you can make up an assignment, and you miss that meeting, you may receive a "0" for that assignment.

SCUPI Honor Code:

- Not getting help from anyone to do his/her work without the professor's permission.
- Not getting help from any outside sources to do his/her work without the professor's permission.

The first instance of plagiarism will result in a failing grade with the option of re-writing the assignment; a second instance will result in failing the assignment and meeting with the program director, and no option for re-writing the assignment; a third instance will result in failing the course and referral to university officials for Honor Code violation.

Active participation is crucial for language learning. Participating in class makes you an engaged learner of English. In this class, participation means:

- arriving at class on time

- being prepared to answer questions
